1. Introduction



In 2025, Hope Land Canada continued to pursue its mission of promoting sustainable agriculture, green entrepreneurship, and community development, both in Canada and internationally. This year marked a decisive step in consolidating the organization's role as a committed player in transforming food systems, empowering rural communities, and mobilizing citizens in favor of environmental protection.

Driven by the vision outlined in its 2025-2030 Strategic Plan, Hope Land Canada strengthened its interventions in several priority sectors. The organization has implemented a series of flagship programs focused on agricultural education, technological innovation, international cooperation, and community engagement. Each of these programs has contributed to realizing its vision of inclusive, sustainable, and innovative development, while strengthening the capacities of young people, families, international workers, and local communities.

The year 2025 was also marked by the creation and expansion of strategic initiatives such as AgroVolontaire, Agrischool Academy, AgriEchange CANCONGO, and AgroCommunity Connect. These initiatives have increased the organization's impact, reached diverse audiences, and amplified the adoption of resilient and environmentally friendly agricultural practices.

Through its actions, Hope Land Canada reaffirms its commitment to building bridges between communities, promoting innovative solutions, and making a tangible contribution to a greener, fairer, and more prosperous future.

2. Governance and institutional development



2.1. Annual General Meeting

Hope Land Canada held its Annual General Meeting on May 24, 2025, online, bringing together members, partners, and program managers to review the past year and adopt key directions for the future.

During this strategic session, several major decisions were approved, including the official name change of the organization from Hope Land Congo Canada Inc. to Hope Land Canada. This change reflects the desire to broaden the institutional scope of the organization, strengthen its Canadian identity, and better represent its field of action both in Canada and internationally.

The Annual General Meeting also provided an opportunity to consolidate internal governance, review operational priorities, and approve technical and financial reports, thereby ensuring transparent and inclusive management in line with the standards of development organizations.

2.2. Strategic Plan 2025-2030

Hope Land Canada's 2025-2030 Strategic Plan served as the main reference framework for all activities carried out in 2025. Designed as an institutional steering document, it defines four priority areas that guide the organization's mission and actions:

1. Sustainable agriculture, aimed at promoting ecological, resilient practices adapted to rural communities.
2. Green entrepreneurship, designed to encourage agricultural innovation, the creation of responsible businesses, and local economic development.
3. Environmental protection, incorporating awareness-raising, citizen mobilization, and sustainable management of natural resources.
4. Innovation, as an essential driver for modernizing educational, technological, and community approaches.

This plan has guided the implementation of flagship programs such as Agrischool Academy, AgroVolontaire, AgriEchange CANCONGO, and AgroCommunity, ensuring strategic coherence, institutional effectiveness, and alignment with national and international priorities for sustainable development.



3. Programs and projects implemented in 2025





3.1. CANCONGO AgriExchange Program

AgriExchange CANCONGO is a bilateral agricultural cooperation program between Canada and the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC), officially launched in 2025. It aims to promote knowledge exchange, innovation in food systems, and skills development for young agripreneurs in both countries.

The year 2025 was marked by significant institutional advances for the program. Hope Land Canada signed a strategic partnership with Radio Rurale Internationale, a major player in community agricultural communication, thereby extending the program's impact to farmers, youth, and rural communities.

In addition, the program received a favorable message from Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada (AAFC), confirming that AgriExchange CANCONGO's objectives are consistent with the priorities of the Canadian Council of Young Farmers (CCYF), particularly in the areas of agricultural careers, agricultural education, food security, climate change, and the environment.

Key objectives:

- Facilitate the transfer of agricultural and technological skills between the two countries.
- Encourage rural entrepreneurship and the involvement of young women in agricultural value chains.
- Build pilot farms, training centers, and agroforestry innovation spaces.
- Organize academic exchanges, technical workshops, mobility programs, and intercontinental visits.

Finally, as part of the program's structure, Hope Land Canada plans to organize the CANADA-DRC Forum on Investment in Sustainable Agriculture and Food Security, scheduled for August 2026, a platform aimed at bringing together institutions, investors, and agri-tech players around agri-food cooperation.

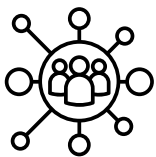
3.2. AgroVolunteer International

The international AgroVolunteer program is a key initiative of Hope Land Canada, whose goal is to mobilize international volunteers to promote sustainable agriculture, community resilience, and rural development. Structured around several components, it aims to strengthen the capacities of international workers, youth, families, and rural communities through concrete actions.

3.2.1. AgroVolunteer-ON (Ontario)

The official launch of the AgroVolunteer ON program took place in Ontario in 2025. This component targets the social and professional integration of international workers (TISA) in the agri-food sector. The program emphasizes autonomy, mobility, access to community services, mental health, and inclusion.

Agrovolunteer-ON is part of the Cultivating Ontario for Market Development initiative, funded by the Canadian Partnership for Sustainable Agriculture (CPSA/SCAP), through the Initiative for the Community Integration of International Workers in the Agri-Food Sector.

Desjardins supports IWAs

An important milestone was also reached on November 20, 2025, with the signing of a partnership agreement with Desjardins, consolidating support for the program and facilitating access to financial services for IWAs.

The goal of this strategic partnership is to organize personal finance workshops, enabling IWAs and volunteers to acquire financial management skills.

This partnership strengthens the program's operational capacity, promotes the socio-economic security of beneficiaries, and positions AgroVolontaire-ON as an innovative model of collaboration between the community sector, the agri-food sector, and responsible financial institutions.





3.2.2. AgroVolunteer-CAN

Rural sentinels at the 2025 Capital Cleanup

As part of its efforts to promote social inclusion, community development, and environmental protection, Hope Land Canada, through its AgroVolontaire CAN program, actively participated in the Grand ménage de la capitale (Capital Cleanup) in the spring of 2025.

On Saturday, September 27, 2025, from 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m., a team of AgroVolontaire CAN Rural Sentinels collected more than 50 kg of waste in the Ben Franklin Place area, located at 101 Centrepointe Drive, Ottawa. This action helped improve the cleanliness and beautify our city.

This first participation is a key step in our commitment to promoting citizen engagement, strengthening community pride, and supporting environmental protection. Hope Land Canada is proud to contribute to this iconic initiative and expresses its gratitude to all the volunteers, partners, and families who participated. Together, we are building a healthier environment and a sustainable future.





3.3. Agrischool Academy Canada



In 2025, Agrischool Academy Canada continued its development through educational programs, practical training, and innovative teaching initiatives aimed at young people, adults, and seniors.

3.3.1. Project: “The Roots of the Future: Hydroponic Gardening and Sustainable Education”

This flagship educational project aims to integrate hydroponic gardens into French-speaking schools in order to raise awareness among students aged 6 to 17 about sustainable agriculture, the environment, healthy nutrition, and the jobs of the future.

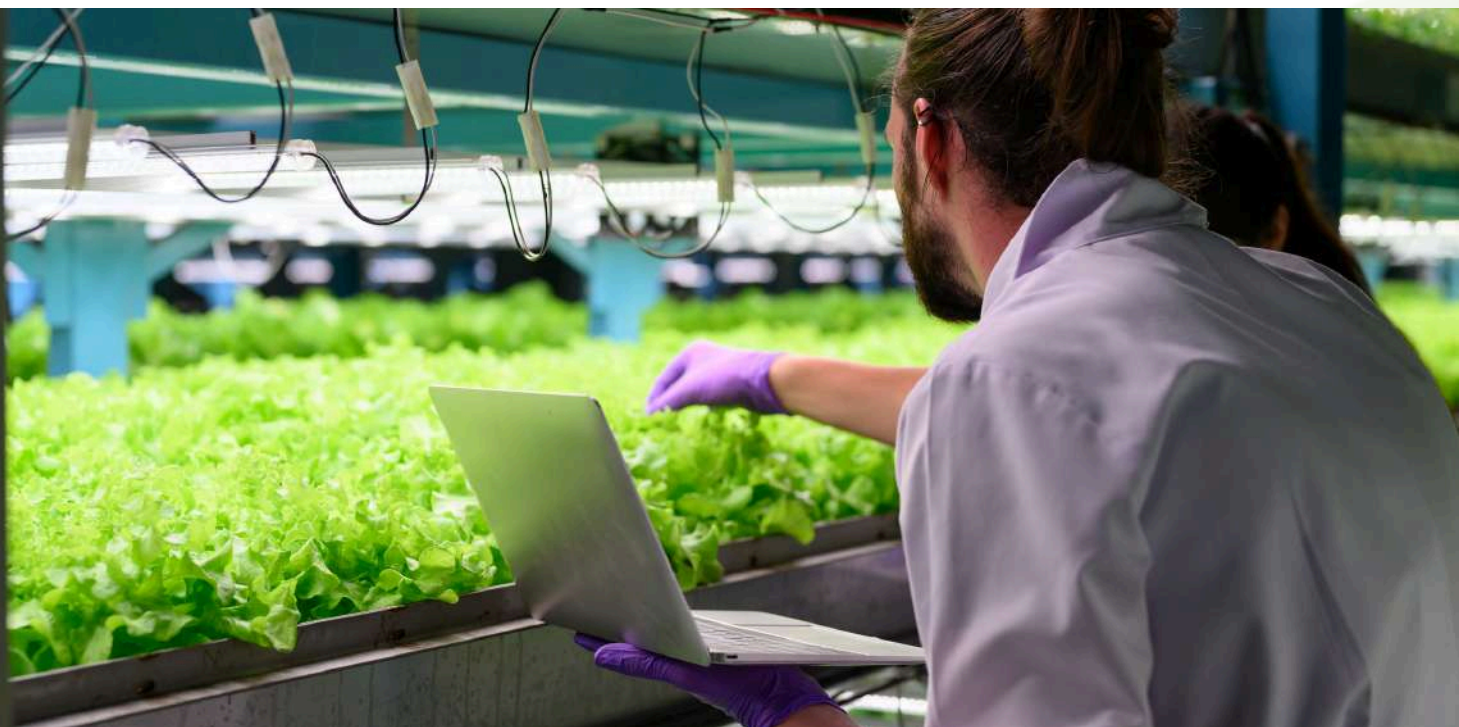
Highlights:

- Practical and collaborative educational activities involving students and teachers.
- Development of technical skills: hydroponics, sowing, growth cycles, healthy eating.
- Involvement of school communities, families, and educational partners.

3.3.2. Adult and senior citizens sections

In addition to the junior program, Agrischool Academy Canada offers:

- training for adults (ages 18–55) in agribusiness, innovation, farm management, and eco-friendly practices;
- activities for seniors that promote social resilience, intergenerational learning, and community involvement.





3.4. Agrocommunity

In 2025, Hope Land Canada continued its commitment to social inclusion, agricultural education, and digital innovation by developing Hope AgroCommunity, a community platform designed in partnership with a group of five intern students from Collège Boréal. This collaboration, made possible by **the Riipen LevelUp** platform, mobilized the students' technological expertise and innovative spirit, while strengthening their practical learning in the fields of agriculture, the environment, and digital solutions applied to community development.

Platform objectives

- Connect young people, families, and communities around agricultural, environmental, and social issues.
- Facilitate access to resources, including training, employment opportunities, and services related to the agri-food sector.
- Promote mental health and community well-being by providing spaces for support, exchange, and socialization.



Results achieved in 2025

- Application creation and delivery completed.
- Skills enhanced for the five students involved: technological innovation, interface design, needs analysis, agricultural platform architecture.
- Platform awaiting launch, subject to:
 - 1.a grant application submitted;
 - 2.a call for funding to finalize hosting and public deployment.
- **Expected impact:** supporting communities by providing them with an integrated tool for agricultural education, social cohesion, employability, and community resilience.

Hope AgroCommunity is an important contribution to Hope Land Canada's digital strategy and a promising lever for addressing several community challenges, while promoting growth and citizen participation.



3.5. Participation in key conferences and events

On April 24, 2025, Hope Land Canada participated in Sudbury Agricultural Networking, an event organized by Collège Boréal's Research and Innovation team and held at Au Pied du Rocher restaurant. This meeting brought together farmers, researchers, entrepreneurs, and agri-food innovation stakeholders.

The organization was represented by Ms. Benie Ilombe, coordinator of the junior component of Agrischool Academy Canada, who presented the program's objectives and its ambition to strengthen agricultural education among young people. Discussions with Ms. Danner Lafontaine, Project Manager - Research and Innovation, focused on opportunities for collaboration in continuing education, youth integration into the workforce, and the development of agricultural skills.



Hope Land Canada also presented an exclusive preview of the Hope AgroCommunity digital project, an application designed to connect farmers, learners, and rural communities through training, networking, and production support tools.

This participation helped raise the organization's profile in Northern Ontario's agri-food ecosystem and opened up concrete avenues for partnership, particularly around short supply chains, purchasing groups, and shared training spaces.

4. Agrischool Academy Congo



In the Democratic Republic of Congo, agriculture still struggles to attract young people due to the sector's poor performance, which is linked to multiple structural constraints. This situation limits access to employment, discourages young people, and exacerbates food insecurity. In light of this, modernizing the agricultural sector and implementing strategies to make it dynamic, profitable, and attractive have become national priorities.

Since its creation in 2017, Agrischool Academy Congo has been an innovative response, offering training in agricultural entrepreneurship geared towards self-reliance and socio-economic integration. The program combines theory, practice, and green education, enabling young people to discover agriculture in its many dimensions and to consider agribusiness activities in their communities.

In 2025, our national coordinator in the DRC, Hope Land Congo, strengthened its mission to train a new generation of agricultural entrepreneurs. The program is based on three pillars:

- Technical training in market gardening, agroforestry, and food processing.
- Agribusiness and empowerment for the creation of agricultural micro-enterprises.
- Green education and awareness-raising in schools.





4.1. Implementation and activities by province

The program was rolled out in four provinces (North Kivu, South Kivu, Kongo Central, and Kinshasa), with content tailored to each context.

1. North Kivu: Resilience and entrepreneurship

In the vulnerable areas of Goma and Mugunga, Agrischool Academy has helped transform precariousness into economic opportunities.

Major impact:

- 700 people trained (young people, women, displaced persons) in market gardening techniques.
- Creation of women's associations specializing in the marketing of vegetables (amaranth, tomatoes, peppers).
- 50 young agripreneurs supported in the administrative formalization of their micro-enterprises.
- 143 university interns welcomed, strengthening the link between agronomic theory and practice.

2. South Kivu: Environmental education and fish farming

Uvira and Nyantende benefited from interventions focused on agricultural education and community fish farming.

Major impact:

- 600 students educated on agroecological practices.
- 50 fish farmers trained in pond management and local fish feed production.
- Weekly monitoring was put in place to reinforce the sustainability of the initiatives.

3. Central Kongo - Innovation and Agroforestry (Kisantu)

An intensive agroforestry boot camp at the Kisantu Botanical Garden brought young people together to discuss solutions for climate change and food security.

Major impact:

- 50 young people trained and pilot plots created.
- A local innovation club set up to provide post-training follow-up.

4. Kinshasa - Urban agriculture and food security

Interventions focused on local production in the city to address the challenges facing the capital.

Major impact:

- 20 young people involved in vegetable production activities.
- Contribution to local food sovereignty in the face of climate disruption.
- Development of urban agripreneurship modules, facilitating integration into agri-food value chains.

Results and impacts

A. Economic impact

- 35% of agripreneurs report a 10-25% increase in income after 6-12 months.
- 60% report improved agricultural yields (techniques, irrigation, compost).
- 12 new micro-agricultural initiatives created in 3 communities.

B. Educational impact

The 400 students who participated in the program demonstrated:

- A 45% improvement in their knowledge of sustainable agriculture.
- 30% want to participate in a green club or school garden.
- 15% expressed an interest in a future career related to agriculture or the environment.

C. Social and community impact

- A notable increase in social cohesion: 38% of participants felt that their community ties had been strengthened.
- 70% of families interviewed report an increase in food security thanks to activities or donations.

D. Environmental impact

- Average reduction of 25% in organic waste in school projects using composting/hydroponics.
- 3 hectares of ecological practices adopted by trained agripreneurs.



5. Outlook for 2026



The year 2026 begins with renewed ambition for Hope Land Canada, which plans to intensify its activities in Canada and the Democratic Republic of Congo through its international programs, training initiatives, and the consolidation of key strategic partnerships.

The planned activities are in line with the 2025-2030 Strategic Plan and aim to amplify the impact on the ground, promote youth mobility, stimulate agricultural innovation, and strengthen environmental resilience.





5.1. AgroVolontaire CONGO

In 2026, Hope Land Canada will roll out the structured expansion of the AgroVolontaire International program, designed to facilitate the mobility of young workers, interns, and volunteers in the agri-food sector.

The main objective is to create an operational bridge between Canada, the DRC, and other partner countries in order to open up new training opportunities, volunteer missions, and professional immersion programs.

At the same time, the AgroVolontaire CONGO version will be strengthened to support rural Congolese communities:

- technical support for agricultural schools and community centers;
- training in agri-entrepreneurship and eco-citizenship;
- mobilization of Canadian volunteers wishing to engage in agricultural cooperation projects.

This initiative will support our various other programs such as Agriéchange CANCONGO, Agrotour International, and Agrischool Academy Congo.

Agrovolontaire CONGO will enable cross-disciplinary skills development, intercultural dynamics among young people, and structured support for local food security.





5.2. Uni-Vert Conference 2026 – CECCE

Hope Land Canada, through Agrischool Academy Canada, will host a workshop on April 29, 2029, at the Uni-Vert Conference organized by the Conseil des écoles catholiques du Centre-Est (CECCE) at the Centre Agro-éducatif. This major event will bring together students, teachers, community leaders, and environmental stakeholders to discuss topics related to eco-citizenship, sustainable development, and climate action.

Hands-on workshop: Making a tawashi sponge

Agrischool Academy Canada will lead a hands-on educational workshop on:

- making a tawashi sponge, an eco-friendly household tool made from recycled fabrics;
- the importance of reuse, waste reduction, and the circular economy;
- raising students' awareness of concrete actions they can take every day to protect the environment.

This workshop therefore enables students to:

- develop environmental awareness, creativity, and practical skills;
- put creative reuse (upcycling) into practice;
- understand the value of materials and their potential;
- actively participate in a sustainable development approach;
- encourage environmental responsibility from an early age;
- strengthen the role of Agrischool Academy as an educational leader in eco-citizenship within French-language schools in Ontario;
- and enhance their ability to act as responsible eco-citizens, in line with CECCE values.

Expected impact

The participation of more than 100 students in grades 9 through 12 in specialized workshops will increase the visibility of Agrischool Academy Canada in French-language schools, stimulate young people's environmental engagement, and strengthen our strategic collaboration with the CECCE.





5.3. Canada–DRC Forum

on Investment in Sustainable Agriculture and Food Security

The Canada–DRC Forum on Investment in Sustainable Agriculture and Food Security is one of the major events planned for 2026 as part of the AgriEchange CANCONGO program. This strategic event aims to strengthen bilateral cooperation, attract responsible investment, promote agricultural innovation, and consolidate exchanges between public, private, and community actors in Canada and the Democratic Republic of Congo.

The forum will bring together government representatives, development institutions, agripreneurs, investors, researchers, community organizations, and technical partners committed to the transition to sustainable food systems.

1. High-level meeting between CANADA and the DRC

Inaugural session bringing together policy makers, ministries, government agencies, research institutions, and key organizations in the agricultural sector.

Objectives:

- present the strategic agricultural priorities of both countries;
- identify concrete avenues for collaboration;
- open a structured institutional dialogue on sustainability, innovation, food security, and agricultural entrepreneurship.

2. Pan-African Women Entrepreneurs Roundtable

A roundtable dedicated to women's entrepreneurship will bring together women agripreneurs from Canada, the DRC, and other African countries.

Issues:

- promoting women's leadership in agricultural value chains;
- highlighting inspiring initiatives;
- exploring financing and partnership opportunities;
- strengthening women's economic empowerment in the agri-food sector.

3. CANCONGO AgriEchange Table

Thematic session devoted to the CANCONGO AgriEchange program, to present:

- the program's objectives, achievements, and prospects;
- opportunities for academic, technical, and entrepreneurial exchanges;
- Canada–DRC mobility projects;
- synergies with institutional actors and strategic partners.

This roundtable will also provide an opportunity to engage new partners, present planned innovation centers, and strengthen intercontinental cooperation on sustainable agriculture.

4. Guided tour

A guided tour will conclude the forum, allowing participants to discover:

- innovative agricultural sites;
- training centers or partner pilot farms;
- exemplary community initiatives or agri-food projects.

This activity aims to offer direct immersion in Canadian or Congolese practices (depending on the location chosen), in order to promote learning, collaboration, and mutual inspiration.



5.4. Hope Land FELLOWSHIP / STAGE

Internship Program in Strategic Communication, Capacity Building, and Resource Mobilization

1. Background and Vision

The Hope Land Fellowship/Internship Program is a structured initiative focused on practical training and professional engagement designed for students in the field of social communications.

It aligns with the mission of Hope Land Canada Inc. to promote:

- sustainable development
- social innovation
- agricultural entrepreneurship
- international cooperation

This program enables students to contribute directly to social impact projects in Canada and internationally.

2. Overall Objective of the Internship

Implement a plan to improve Hope Land Canada’s communication, structures, and research through a practical and strategic approach.

3. Strategic Focus Areas of the Internship

The internship is structured around three main pillars:

Strategic Communication

- Content development (articles, social media, press releases)
- Structuring internal and external communications
- Developing an editorial strategy
- Enhancing the visibility of programs

Renforcement des capacités organisationnelles

- Analysis of organizational needs
- Contribution to the development of internal tools
- Development of training guides and modules
- Analysis of organizational and community dynamics

Mobilisation des ressources (financement & partenariats)

- Seeking donors
- Identifying funding opportunities
- Mapping strategic partners
- Assisting with the drafting of proposals

4. A structured and strategic list of institutions with strong potential for collaboration in communications, international development, agribusiness, and social innovation.

- Canadian universities: Saint Paul University, University of Ottawa, Carleton University, University of Montreal, Université du Québec à Montréal, McGill University, York University, University of Toronto, etc.
- Canadian colleges: La Cité, Algonquin College, Collège Boréal, etc.
- American University and colleges
- International institutions
- Internship programs and platforms: Rippen, Mitacs, AIESEC, etc.



5.5. Strengthened strategic partnerships

In 2026, Hope Land Canada will roll out a structured strategy aimed at expanding its institutional, philanthropic, and academic network. This approach is fully in line with the organization's mission—to promote sustainable agriculture, green entrepreneurship, environmental protection, and innovation—as well as with the four pillars of the 2025–2030 Strategic Plan. It also contributes to the concrete advancement of several Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

Planned areas of partnership:

- Consolidate strong partnerships in Canada, particularly with municipalities, schools, universities, research centers, agricultural organizations, and agri-food businesses, in order to support training, innovation, and community integration.
- Related SDGs: SDG 4 (Quality Education), SDG 8 (Decent Work), SDG 17 (Partnerships for the Goals).
- Build international collaborations consistent with the priorities of the 2025–2030 Strategic Plan, with a particular focus on innovation, applied research, climate adaptation, and strengthening food systems.
- Related SDGs: SDG 2 (Zero Hunger), SDG 13 (Climate Action), SDG 9 (Industry, Innovation and Infrastructure).
- Engage alliances with philanthropic foundations, international donors, government institutions, and private partners to support flagship programs (AgriEchange CANCONGO, AgroVolontaire International, Agrischool, AgroCommunity Connect).
- Related SDGs: SDG 1 (No Poverty), SDG 5 (Gender Equality), SDG 10 (Reduced Inequalities), SDG 11 (Sustainable Cities and Communities).
- Develop operational relationships with organizations specializing in training, agritech, green entrepreneurship, the environment, and sustainable development to accelerate the dissemination of innovative solutions in Canadian and Congolese territories.
- Related SDGs: SDG 12 (Responsible consumption and production), SDG 15 (Life on land), SDG 17 (Partnerships for the goals).

Expected impact:

- This partnership dynamic will enable Hope Land Canada to:
- increase its influence in agricultural, educational, and technological ecosystems;
- mobilize more financial, technical, and human resources;
- strengthen its role as a catalyst for sustainable development;
- make a tangible contribution to achieving the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) in Canada and the Democratic Republic of Congo.

By joining forces with an expanded network of strategic partners, Hope Land Canada is consolidating its position as a major player in inclusive, sustainable, and innovation-based agricultural transformation.





5.6. Strengthening the 2025-2030 Strategic Plan

In 2026, Hope Land Canada will continue to strengthen the implementation of its 2025-2030 Strategic Plan, consolidating its actions around its four priority pillars: sustainable agriculture, green entrepreneurship, environmental protection, and innovation. This strategic direction aims to further structure the organization's initiatives and ensure consistency between its educational, community, and entrepreneurial programs.

The organization will also focus on the continuous improvement of its programs, including Agrischool Academy Canada, AgroVolunteer, and AgriExchange CANCONGO, in order to strengthen their impact on young people, agripreneurs, and rural communities. The development of educational tools, collaborative platforms, and training activities will help support the emergence of a new generation committed to sustainable agriculture and the green economy.

Finally, Hope Land Canada will continue to expand its network of institutional, academic, and private partnerships, both in Canada and internationally. This dynamic will increase the social, environmental, and economic impact of the organization's initiatives, while promoting the mobilization of resources, the sharing of expertise, and the implementation of innovative projects that serve communities.

6. Finances



In 2025, thanks to its initiatives and the relevance of its actions in the field, Hope Land Canada Inc. reached an important milestone in mobilizing resources to support its programs in Canada and internationally.

In this context, the organization obtained funding for the implementation of the AgroVolontaire-ON program, an initiative aimed at promoting the community integration of international workers in the agri-food sector in Ontario. This program is part of the Cultivating Ontario for Market Development initiative of the Sustainable Canadian Agricultural Partnership, a national program aimed at strengthening innovation, competitiveness, and sustainability in the Canadian agricultural sector.

This project has also received financial support from Desjardins Group, a partner committed to economic development, social inclusion, and community innovation.

This financial support reflects Hope Land Canada's growing credibility and the relevance of its initiatives in the areas of:

- sustainable agriculture
- social integration
- agricultural entrepreneurship
- international cooperation

Thanks to these resources, the organization has been able to strengthen its field activities, support rural communities, and develop structural initiatives that promote food security, agricultural innovation, and youth engagement.
